## SOUTH AFRICAN CHONDRICHTHYAN DATABASE

The chondrichthyan fauna of South Africa is one of the richest in the world with 191 species, comprising 50 families and 103 genera. There are 30 families, 64 genera and 111 species of sharks; 17 families, 36 genera and 72 species of batoids; 3 families, 5 genera and 8 species of chimaeras.

Download the most up-to-date database incorporating the 191 species found in South African waters. It was created by fisheries staff from DFFE and I have updated it, based on the following publication:
